CL101 MINUTES

RESOLVED -

CL102 ANNOUNCEMENTS

(a) Milton Keynes Rugby Club

The Mayor congratulated Milton Keynes Rugby Club on
winning the Southern Counties Cup by defeating Dorchester
40 points to 10.

(b) Olney Pancake Race

The Mayor announced that Katie Godof had won the Annual
Olney Pancake yesterday in a time of 1 minute and 6 seconds
and that Whitney Hay had won the sister race in Liberal,
Kansas in a time of 1 minute and 9 seconds making Katie
Godof the overall winner of the international pancake
challenge for 2020.

(c) Preparation of the Council Budget

The Mayor thanked all staff colleagues, particularly Steve Richardson, the Council's Director of Finance, his Heads of Finance, Anna Rulton and Natasha Hutchin, who were more than ably supported by the finance team and colleagues across the Council, for their work on preparing the budget over quite a few months.

(d) John Napleton

The Mayor I announced the recent death of John Napleton, who had been the Property Management Director at Milton Keynes Development Corporation. Also since the demise of the Development Corporation in 1992 Mr Napleton had continued his involvement in Milton Keynes and had taken active part in the community.

(e) Former Councillor Reg Edwards

The Mayor announced with sadness the sudden death of former councillor Reg Edwards.

The Mayor announced, recognising that a number of councillors would wish to pay their respects to former councillor Edwards, indicated that he would make time available at the Council's next meeting in March.

CL103

DISCLOSURE OF INTERESTS

The Council was advised that as any payment of, or liability to pay, Council Tax did not create a disclosable pecuniary interest as defined in the national rules; all councillors were eligible to take part in the business of setting the Council Tax or precept

Councillor Marland advised the Council, in respect of the Council's consideration of the Council Budget 2020/21 and the Medium Term Financial Plan 2020/21 to 2023/24, including the Capital Programme (Item 4[b]) that his wife was the key holder for New Bradwell Village Hall, but he had no financial interest and that would preclude him from taking part in any discussions or votes the Council might have.

CL104

PETITIONS

(a) Oakhill Play Park

The Council received a petition requesting the provision of a play park in Oakhill.

Nicolas Cadman, in presenting the petition of over 75 signatures, drew attention to the benefits which would accrue to local children if a play park, which allowed children to play in a safe environment, was provided, these included making friends and undertaking physical activity. It would also encourage parents to meet and share experiences.

Nicolas Cadman also drew attention to the fact that Oakhill was the only area in Loughton and Shenley Ward which did not already have a play park.

Councillor Priestley, the responsible Cabinet member, thanked Nicolas Cadman for presenting the petition and informed the Council that there had been initial discussions with local councillors and parish councils to identify potential sites. Councillor Priestley hoped to meet with all the key players to discuss potential sites which would then need to be risk assessed to identify the most appropriate.

Councillor Priestley indicated that she would like to progress this matter as soon as possible and undertook to keep the petitioners informed of progress.

Nicolas Cadman thanked Councillor Priestley for the positive response and encouraged the Council to allocate funds in the Budget for the construction of a play park for Oakhill.

(b) Union Street, Newport Pagnell

The Council received a petition requesting the resurfacing of the Pavement in Union Street, Newport Pagnell and measures to stop pavement parking and reduce vehicle speeds in Union Street.

Councillor Bowyer, in presenting the petition of 120 signatures, drew the Council's attention to the problems and risks faced by the elderly and infirm if a pavement was slightly uneven, particularly those who used wheelchairs and wheeled walkers.

Councillor Bowyer stated that those problems were exacerbated when cars parked on the pavement, forcing pedestrians into the road where they had to contend with speeding traffic.

Councillor Bowyer recognised that the Council's officers had been very co-operative in undertaking works to Union Street, but as full surface skimming was not programmed for another three years Councillor Bowyer requested that an exception be

made and the works brought forward to recognise that the population in Union Street was predominantly elderly who were at a high risk of experiencing trips and falls.

Councillor Darlington, the responsible Cabinet member, thanked Councillor Bowyer for presenting the petition and informed the Council that she was aware of the accessibility issues experienced by many residents and as a result was having ongoing discussions with Councillor Alexander, whose motion on the more general issue was agreed unanimously by the Council at its last meeting.

Councillor Darlington undertook to discuss the particular issues raised by the petition in respect of Union Street with officer colleagues and present a report to a future meeting of the Cabinet.

QUESTIONS FROM MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC

Question from Sherry Gladwin to Councillor O'Neill (Cabinet member for Health and Wellbeing and Deputy Leader of the Council)

Sherry Gladwin asked Councillor O'Neill if she agreed with her that:

- (a) any vulnerable adult, diagnosed with a very serious and rare mental ailment, who was under the care of Milton Keynes Council deserved the utmost efforts by Milton Keynes Council to avoid being in a place that would severely exacerbate their condition and cause the utmost trauma; and
- (b) it was not good for the vulnerable adult, to have been arrested, held in custody for two days before being remanded to Prison, without the Council using its best efforts to secure their release?

Thanking Sherry Gladwin for the question Councillor O'Neill indicated that because of the subject matter of the question she was not able to disclose specific details in a meeting open to the public. However, she was regularly briefed on the particular issue and was aware that officers were working closely with other agencies to ensure a safe release from custody as soon as possible.

Councillor O'Neill undertook to provide a detailed written response within a week.

Sherry Gladwin as a supplementary question asked Councillor O'Neill if she would set up an independent investigation into this matter to see how such an awful situation has arisen.

Councillor O'Neill reiterated that she was unable to disclose specific details because of the nature of the issue and because the matter was subject to court proceedings. She would however, provide a detailed written response within a week.

CONSTITUTION COMMISSION – 16 JANUARY 2020: CHANGES TO THE CONSTITUTION – SUBMISSION OF PUBLIC QUESTIONS / PETITIONS

9.3 Notice of Questions

A question may only be asked if notice has been given by delivering it in writing or by electronic mail to the Monitoring Officer no later than **48 hours (excluding weekends and public holidays)** before the start of the meeting.

e.g. If a meeting starts at 6:30 pm on a Tuesday the deadline for questions would be 6:30 pm on the preceding Friday.

9.12 Petitions

(b) Petitions received by no later than **48 hours (excluding weekends and public holidays)** before the start of the meeting may be presented to the Council.

e.g. If a meeting starts at 6:30 pm on a Tuesday the deadline for petitions would be 6:30 pm on the preceding Friday."

The Council heard from two members of the public during consideration of this matter.

COUNCIL BUDGET 2020/21 AND MEDIUM TERM FINANCIAL PLAN 2020/21 TO 2023/24

Councillor Marland moved the recommendations from the meeting of the Cabinet held on 4 February 2020, together with recommendations relating to the precepts from the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner, the Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes Fire Authority and parish / town councils, necessary for the Council to adopt when setting the level of Council Tax, which were seconded by Councillor Middleton:

1. "That the Revenue Budget 2020/21 totalling £209.534m be approved.
2. That the Council Tax at Band D of £1,429.86, for the Milton Keynes element of the Council Tax, be approved, noting that this is an increase of 3.49%, consisting of a 1.99% general increase and a 1.50% Adult Social Care Precept.
3. That the Council Tax requirement for the Council's own purposes for 2020/21 (excluding Parish Precepts) of £123.954m, be noted.
4. That the following amounts be calculated for the year 2020/21 in accordance with Sections 31 to 36 of the Local Government Finance Act 1992 [the "Act"]:
 - (a) £562.208m Being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(2) of the Act taking into account all precepts issued to it by parish and town councils. (Gross expenditure including precepts)
 - (b) £429.752m Being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(3). (Net income excluding Council Tax requirement.)
 - (c) £132.456m As its Council Tax requirement for the year, being the amount by which the aggregate at (a) above exceeds the aggregate at (b) above, calculated by the Council, in accordance with Section 31A(4).
 - (d) £1,527.92 As the basic amount of its Council Tax for the year (including Parish Precepts), being the amount at (c) above, divided by the Council Tax Base agreed on 5 November 2019.
 - (e) £8,501,088 Being the aggregate amount of all special items (Parish Precepts) referred to in Section 34(1) of the Act.
 - (f) £1,429.86 Being the amount at (d) less the result given by dividing the amount at (e) above by the Council Tax Base agreed on 5 November 2019, as the basic amount of Council Tax for the year for Milton Keynes Council, excluding Parish and Major Precepting Authorities.

The Council heard from the Leaders of the Conservative Group and the Leader of the Liberal Democrat Group, together with Councillor R Bradburn, Chair of the Budget and Resources Scrutiny Committee as well as receiving the response from Councillor Middleton, Cabinet member for Resources and Innovation to the recommendations of the Budget and Resources Scrutiny Committee.

The Council also received the responses to the public consultation on its draft budget.

Councillor R Bradburn moved the following amendment on behalf of the Liberal Democrat Group, which was seconded by Councillor McCall and accepted by Councillor Marland, mover of the motion:

“1. That the following words are added to the end of recommendation 1 from the Cabinet meeting on 4 February 2020:

’, subject to:

(a) Weeding and Clearance 141 estates and residential areas £97,000

The inclusion of an additional item to one-off expenditure pressures of £97,000 in 2020/21 to fund additional weeding and clearance across 141 estates and residential areas in Milton Keynes to improve the quality of the public realm.

(b) Street Name Plates £40,000

The inclusion of an additional item to one-off expenditure pressures of £40,000 in 2020/21 to increase the number of street name plates being replaced.

(c) Children's Mental Health £45,000

The inclusion of an additional item to one-off expenditure pressures of £45,000 in 2020/21 to fund additional Children's Mental Health support in the form of targeted young people's drug and alcohol work.

(d) School Lunch Club Fund £25,000

The inclusion of an additional item to one-off expenditure pressures of £25,000 in 2020/21, to be ring-fenced to provide one-off grants to schools to start breakfast and/or lunch at least three days a week during both term and non-term time, for 'waged poor' primary and junior aged school children. Supporting the start-up of these clubs will help ensure MK's children are fed and ready to learn.

(e) Various Schemes Campbell Park and Old Woughton Ward £60,000

The inclusion of an additional item to one-off expenditure pressures of £60,000 in 2020/21, to be ring-fenced to the following schemes in Campbell Park and Old Woughton Ward:

- (i) Bolbeck Park – reinstatement of the speed bump on St Stephens Drive
- (ii) Pennyland – resurface remaining area of Sovereign Drive
- (iii) Springfield – resurfacing of Kenwood Gate
- (iv) Directional signs – new directional signage to Sudgrove House at the junction of Fairford Crescent, Oakley Gardens and Cornbury Crescent)
- (v) Directional road markings on Mullen and Bayard Avenues, Downs Barn
- (vi) Springfield – repair steps on path from Belsize Place to The Fleet
- (vii) Downs Barn – add glass front to new bus shelter on Darley Gate

2. That the following words be added to the Capital Programme recommendation from the Cabinet meeting on 4 February 2020:

‘, subject to:

- (a) Supporting Access and Mobility £100,000

The inclusion of an additional item to the Capital Programme of £100,000 in 2020/21 only, as a capital provision to support access and mobility across Milton Keynes by providing dropped kerbs and revised cycle barriers on Redways and footpaths. This follows Councillor Alexander’s motion to full Council in January 2020.

- (b) Road Improvement Measures £140,000

The inclusion of an additional item to the Capital Programme of £140,000 in 2020/21 only, as a capital provision, to fund Broughton Eastern Expansion Area road improvement measures.

All seven budget changes to be funded from the 2019/20 Collection Fund Surplus.”

Councillor P Geary moved the following amendments on behalf of the Conservative Group, which were seconded by Councillor Walker and on which recorded votes were requested:

1. “That the following words are added to the end of recommendation 1 from the Cabinet meeting on 4 February 2020:

‘subject to:

- (a) the Cabinet’s Investment Proposal (Annex W) being amended as follows:

Amendment 1

£75K being removed from Line C27 (Special Blue Projects) and reallocated to reducing street homelessness in Milton Keynes;

Amendment 2

All the money allocated, confirmed by the Section 151 Officer as £750k, for work for MK2050 (Line C1 [Strategy to 2050]) being reallocated as follows:

- (a) £530k for extra pothole repairs;

- (b) £170k for extra White and Yellow lining across the borough; and
- (c) £50k for an Oak Hill Play Park, being the only estate in the western flank without a play park.

Amendment 3

£250k and £20k respectively from Lines C24 (Green Roof Bus Shelters and Port Cochere) and C24 (a) (Parish Green Roof Fund) being reallocated as follows:

- (a) £5k for beehives at the Civic Offices and other Council buildings;
- (b) £45k for bird boxes bug hotels and other biodiversity projects in areas of greatest need across the Borough; and
- (c) £220k for further drain and gulley clearance and to identify capital schemes where further work is required.

Amendment 4

References in Lines C3 to C10 (Investing in Our City Centre) and in the Heading to the Section being amended so that they relate to investment across the whole of the borough, not just in the city centre;

Amendment 5

The figure of 2,000 Trees being amended to 10,000 Trees in Line C28 (Borough-wide Tree Planting and Replacement) to act as a carbon sink and improve biodiversity with the allocated budget being reduced to £30,000 and the balance of £70,000 being reallocated as follows:

- (a) £6,000 to supply and install flood early warning sensors in Stoke Goldington;
- (b) £4,000k for 1,000 hydrogel sandbags to protect properties from flooding in Stoke Goldington; and
- (c) £95,000 to bring forward path resurfacing from 2023 to 2020 at Union Street Newport Pagnell outside the Lawnsmead Care Home, the remainder of the funding (£35,000) coming from the contingency.

Amendment 6

Line C36 (Loughton Obelisk)

- (a) The Line being re-titled 'Great Holm Obelisk' as there is no obelisk in Loughton and the photographs of Councillor Nolan are in front of the Great Holm Obelisk;
- (b) the spelling of the word 'Obelisk' being corrected; and
- (c) £20K being added for road improvements around the obelisk that are desperately needed, with funding coming from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or unallocated New Homes Bonus, or taken from currently planned contingencies.

Amendment 7

The addition of £20k from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or the unallocated New Homes Bonus, or from currently planned contingencies to fund communities across the borough in celebrating the 75th anniversaries of VE and VJ Day.

Amendment 8

The addition of £200,000 to the Neighbourhood Employment Programme over 2 years in order to keep its reach across all Milton Keynes estates, not just in the regeneration estates, with funding to be taken from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or the unallocated New Homes Bonus, or from currently planned contingencies.

Amendment 9

The addition of £400,000 as an Antisocial Behaviour Emergency Fund to be used as follows:

- (a) £150k a year for 2 years to establish a new antisocial behaviour taskforce in partnership with the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner, including supporting the creation of new Police Community Support Officer roles that have a borough wide role in reducing anti-social behaviour, which will be match funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner and will fund at least 5 new Police Community Support Officers for Milton Keynes

- (b) £50k a year over 2 years, to launch a New Anti-Social Behaviour prevention grant to be made available to grassroots organisations such as youth clubs, football clubs, boxing and martial arts clubs etc.

To be funded from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or the unallocated New Homes Bonus, or from currently planned contingencies.

Amendment 10

The addition of £80,000 to fund a pedestrian crossing on Queensway, with funding to be taken from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or the unallocated New Homes Bonus, or from currently planned contingencies.

Amendment 11

The addition of £440,000 to help reduce levels of Domestic Violence to be used as follows:

- (a) £280k for the Freshstart Rehabilitation Domestic Violence Programme, which educates repeat offenders and has been successful in reducing reoffending, as evidenced by the very low rates of reoffending after the course, and is seen as really progressive nationally. To be funded from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or the unallocated New Homes Bonus, or from currently planned contingencies; and
- (b) £160k for two Independent Domestic Violence Advocates, initially for a 2 year fixed period, as 600/700 referrals are dealt with in Milton Keynes a year and there are currently only 4.3 Independent Domestic Violence Advocates in Milton Keynes when there needs to be a team of at least 6 or 7 Advocates to meet national Safe Lives standards. To be funded from The Business Rates Appeals Reduction, or the unallocated New Homes Bonus, or from currently planned contingencies.”

Amendment 12

2. That the following additional clauses be added to the Cabinet's recommendation:
 - (a) That where possible any additional tree planting be based on Council land and planted with the use of woodland grants. Trees should be mixed species to create a diverse habitat, with planting commencing on those parts of Tickford Fields Farm, Newport Pagnell not covered by either the Milton Keynes East Development Proposals or the Newport Pagnell Neighbourhood Plan.
 - (b) That it be noted that no wetland can have zero maintenance implications and requests that the maintenance is calculated and put into the base budget in 2021/22.
 - (c) That the Constitution Commission be requested to consider all budgets having a 'carbon budget' that goes along with them so the Council is able to understand the impacts changes to the budget have on the carbon output of the city.
 - (d) That, recognising that at the moment existing Domestic Violence refuges are large enough to deal with the current population, but won't be so by 2025, requests Cabinet to work to ensure that the planning for extra Domestic Violence Refuge space happens as the city grows."

Amendments 7, 10 and 12(b) were accepted by Councillor Marland, mover of the motion.

The voting on the remaining Conservative amendments was as follows:

Amendment 1
