



Community



Lilac is an innovative and pioneering cohousing project completed in March 2013 in Bramley, Leeds in the UK. It features 20 homes and a shared common house built from straw bales and timber. Lilac is a member-led not-for-profit co-operative and aims to share its learning with others. This series of briefing notes outlines the various aspects of the Lilac model and its key features. - Lilac is a cohousing community which combines private homes with shared central space.
- Cohousing is a design approach to building strong communities and is widespread throughout the world.
- Lilac is a bone-fide co-operative equally controlled by all its members.
- Members use consensus decision making rather than majority voting.
- Lilac uses community agreements to outline expectations in areas such as food, pets, communal spaces, and guests.
- Four levels of decision-making are used: major, significant, routine, emergency.
- Lilac has eight task teams that make routine decisions: finance, landscape, maintenance, food, process, community, publicity, learning. Participation is voluntary and rotates.
- Lilac holds General Meetings every two months where proposals and major decisions are agreed.
- Lilac has a Board of members (the Hub) which meets six times per year and provides an overview on legal/financial issues.
